Drug charges were the most frequent type of crime (24%) committed by new entries to probation in 2017, followed by driving while impaired (17%), larceny (15%), and assault (11%). The majority of parole entries during 2017 were drugs-non-trafficking (13%), robbery (9%). Other crimes were assault (8%) and burglary (7%). The most frequent crime category for post-release supervision cases was drugs-non-trafficking (17%). Other crimes were breaking and entering (12%), larceny (10 %), habitual felon (9%), robbery (8%), and assault (7%)
