Attorney Jeff Gray presented the Attorney's Report, which included updates about the status of consent agreements, pending administrative rules changes, and legislative updates.

Motion: Tommy Whisnant motioned to approve the Attorney's Report. Tom Vermillion seconded. The motion carried unanimously.

I. CONSENT AGREEMENTS & CIVIL PENALTIES

On October 13, 2025, Greg Widmaier/VSC Fire & Security, Inc., entered into a Consent Agreement in the amount of \$8,160.00 for registration violations. The Consent Agreement was signed by QA Greg Widmaier on January 27, 2026. Payment has not been received.

On July 16, 2025, Langston Cutshaw/Gallaher & Associates, Inc., entered into a Consent Agreement in the amount of \$1,224.00 for registration violations. The Consent Agreement was signed by QA Langston Cutshaw on January 27, 2026. (PAID IN FULL)

On January 2, 2026, Robert Quick/Sure-Veillance entered into a Consent Agreement in the amount of \$1,105.00 for registration violations. The Consent Agreement was signed by QA Robert Quick on January 27, 2026. (PAID IN FULL)

On December 8, 2025, Eric Christian/Global Guardian entered into a Consent Agreement in the amount of \$637.50 for registration violations. The Consent Agreement was signed by QA Eric Christian on January 31, 2026. (PAID IN FULL)

III. ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

Passage of Senate Bill 710 (S.L. 2025-51) necessitated the amendment of numerous administrative rules since the most substantive feature of this bill was the change of the name of the Act, and the Board, from "Alarm Systems" to "Security Systems." The good news is that for rules where there was only a change of name, you did not have to go through the rulemaking process; merely a letter to the Rulemaking Coordinator at the Office of Administrative Hearings requesting the change. However, nine other rules had to go

through the usual process. These nine were 14B NCAC 17 .0103, .0105, .0108, .0201, .0202, .0209, .0210, .0301, and .0305. For some, the amendment was as simple as changing "alarm" to "security system," and in two (.0201 and .0301) additional language was added since Senate Bill 710 also authorized the Board to access and consider criminal convictions that have been expunged. Three rules now reflect language detailing the contents of the respective application. (The Private Protection Services Board had rules with virtually identical language and was forced by the Rules Review Commission to detail the contents of its applications. I am attempting to avoid the same disruption of your rules.)

The Board voted at its September meeting to approve these nine rules as amended and the Notice of Text was filed September 24, 2025. The Public Hearing was Tuesday, November 4, 2025, at the Board's office, and the Public Comment Period expired December 15, 2025. There were no comments, written or oral. You voted to approve these rule amendments at your meeting on January 13<sup>th</sup>. I received a Request for Change for only three of these rules and all nine are scheduled to be considered by the Rules Review Commission at its meeting on March 26<sup>th</sup>.

Unfortunately, the Codifier of Rules determined after the fact that he could not make the name change in three of the rules submitted by letter. You must, therefore, start the process all over for these three. They are 14B NCAC 17 .0101, .0401, and .0504. Copies are attached as Attachment 2.

However, one of the rules actually should be repealed. The Board has not had a recovery fund in many years, but the definitional section for the former recovery fund is one of the three rules above. I see no reason to keep it. A vote is in order today to amend .0101 and .0504 and repeal .0401.

#### IV. LITIGATION

At your September Board meeting, I was instructed to seek an injunction against Aabo Home, LLC, a Florida limited liability company, and its co-owner, for unlicensed activity. In a five-month period, the Board had received seven complaints against the company and during the investigation had discovered an active internet presence aimed at potential NC customers.

Surprisingly, Aabo Home has a Certificate of Authority to do business in North Carolina registered with the Secretary of State's Office.

A Complaint for Injunctive Relief was filed on October 8, 2025, and Aabo Home's NC registered agent was served on October 14, 2025. An Answer

(other pleading) was due on November 16, 2025, but nothing was filed. Entry of Default was made December 5, 2025, and I moved for Default Judgment of the Defendants on December 29<sup>th</sup>. The signed order was received on January 15, 2026, and the Plaintiffs were served.

During this time, and with the assistance of Mr. Whisnant, Mr. Sherwin and I have been communicating with the Attorney General's Office about it taking action against this company.

## V. LEGISLATION

Senate Bill 451, Occupational Professional Licensing Relief, would require 26 enumerated boards to cut their required continuing education hours in half (i.e. "by fifty percent (50%)") or double the amount of time the licensee has to comply (i.e. if 12 months, then 24).

For seven enumerated boards whose requirements are set forth in their administrative rules, the board is required to amend its administrative rule(s). For 16 other boards – including the Alarm Systems Licensing Board – the bill actually amends the board's statute (here, G.S. 74D-4(e1); *see*, Attachment 4) and instructs the board to adopt rules to implement the change. In the case of the Board, it would mean amending (or re-writing) 14B NCAC 17.0502.

Referred to the Senate Committee on Regulatory Reform April 7, 2025 and debated, in committee without a vote, on April 16<sup>th</sup>. (Interestingly, the identical language of the bill briefly appeared in another bill, HB 763, above, by way of committee substitute but was subsequently removed.)
