New GCC Commissioner - Judge Tom Murry

Judge Murry graduated from Campbell University School of Law where he was elected to the Morrisville Town Council during his time in school. After graduating law school, he served as executive director of the Pharmacy Compounding Accreditation Board. Judge Murry is a licensed attorney in North Carolina and the District of Columbia. He was re-elected to the Morrisville Town Council in 2009.

In 2010, he was elected to the North Carolina House of Representatives for District 41 in western Wake County and was

re-elected in 2012. He served as chair of the Commerce and Job Development Committee and chair of the Natural and Economic Resources Appropriations Subcommittee. Judge Murry served as Chief Legal Counsel for External Affairs at the NC Judicial Branch from 2015-19. In this capacity, he worked directly with Chief Justice Mark Martin to improve access to justice and partnered with the other co-equal branches of government to protect law and order in our state.

Judge Murry joined the North Carolina Army National Guard as a judge advocate in 2014 and is currently a major. From 2017 to 18, Judge Murry deployed to the Middle East. He served as chief of client services for the NCARNG after leaving the NC Judicial Branch from 2019-2020. Judge Murry has represented soldiers, their families and military retirees in a variety of legal matters.

Judge Murry worked as an assistant district attorney in the Prosecutorial District II comprised of Franklin, Granville, Person, Vance and Warren counties starting in late 2020. From 2024 to 25, he served as chair of the Criminal Justice Section of the NC Bar Association and currently serves on the NC Court of Appeals. Chief Justice Paul Newby appointed Judge Murry to serve on the Governor's Crime Commission in January 2025.
