WHAT is YASI?

- An innovative risk, needs, strengths, and trauma assessment for justice involved youth.
- Implemented internationally and in 14 other states
- Assessment collects information within 12 Domains of Need
 - 11 of the domains are targeted for service planning
 - Only Legal History is not included for service planning
- Pre-Screen: Administered to <u>ALL</u> Youth with a Complaint Starts at Intake
 34 Items Purpose: Classification
- Full Assessment: Administered to youth who
 - Receive a complaint that is approved for court OR
 - Pre-Screen level is Moderate or High Risk (Diversions)

104 Items (includes Pre-Screen) Purpose: Service Planning



WHY YASI?

- Measures Change in Criminogenic Thinking
- Inclusion of Strengths & Protective Factors
- Develops Individualized Service Plans
- Matches Services to Needs
- More Dynamic Assessment
- Improves the Way We Assess Youth
- Screens for Trauma Based on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)

How is a YASI completed?

JCC collects information - Semi-structured interview, file review, etc.

Interpreting the YASI Wheel: Need levels on the outside and Strength levels on the inside of the Wheel



On the Outside Perimeter of YASI Wheel 3 Levels: Low, Moderate and High indicate the level of need for service in a specific domain (e.g., family, school, etc.). "N" = no needs in the domain



On the Inside of YASI Wheel

3 Levels: Low, Moderate and High levels of strength in a specific domain (e.g., in Family, School, etc.). "N" = no strengths in the domain

Flags on the YASI Wheel

Basic Needs & Physical Health Up to 3 flags display (No flags=no problems)	a minor need for youth/family	2 needs for youth/family significant need (e.g., homelessness, medical condition with no health insurance)	YASI Trauma Index 0/10
Mental Health Up to 2 flags display (No flags=no problems)	1 mental health problem indicator	2 or more mental health problem indicators, an official mental health diagnosis or a serious matter such as suicidal intent	The YASI Trauma Index score ranges from 0 to 10. Youth receive 1 point for each Adverse Childhood Experience they have experienced.
Violence (past or current) Up to 2 flags display (No flags=no violence)	responsible for a violent incident	responsible for 2 or more violent incidents	For example, a score of 3/10 indicates a youth experienced 3 of the 10 possible Adverse Childhood Experiences included in YASI.



Gender Responsive

 YASI "cut-off" scores are different for girls and boys (to correct for the tendency for risk assessments to overclassify girls)

 Ongoing research focuses on developing improved scoring models for girls and boys

Juvenile Justice Referral Items to JCPC Funded Programs

Varies based on level of JJ Involvement

Complaint Diverted with Low Risk = Universal

Referral Form and Pre-Screen

Complaint Diverted with Mod/High Risk or Complaint approved for Court or already been to Court = Universal Referral, Full YASI Assessment/YASI

Wheel, and Service Plan (once completed)



Directive from DPS Management

"Effective January 1, 2021, when a juvenile court counselor refers a juvenile to a JCPC or Juvenile Justice funded program, the juvenile court counselor shall provide the following referral documents:

* A completed Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) Universal Referral Form or the appropriate program-specific referral form (Eckerd, Methodist Home for Children, and AMIkids, Inc.);

* A copy of the completed YASI Pre-Screen for juveniles assessed as low risk; For juveniles assessed as moderate or high risk on the YASI Pre-Screen and for juveniles approved for court, a copy of the completed Full YASI assessment, service plan, and YASI wheel;

* A copy of the Juvenile Family Data Sheet which will include the assessment narrative; and

* A copy of the Juvenile Justice Behavioral Health Consent for Release of Information Form (CS 011b)."



How YASI is Used – JJ vs Providers

Juvenile Court Services

Program Providers

- Supports decision to approve or not for court
- Risk Level Case Management Level
- Assess for Strengths Can be used to address a need area
- Identifies (Criminogenic) Needs Area to target for addressing needs with a youth
- Recommendations for court disposition
- Service planning (including Service Matching – Service Directory is imported)
- Reassessment Dynamic Changes show progress!
- YASI the basis for which JJ conducts all work with youth and family.

Dear Service Provider,

In 2019, the Juvenile Justice Section of NC's Department of Public Safety launched a directory of services and programs addressing the needs of juvenile justice-involved youth and families. Juvenile Court Counselors, other Juvenile Justice employees, law enforcement personnel, members of the judiciary, and prosecuting and defense attorneys use this directory to identify programs and services to which youth and families can be referred. The directory is also available for use by members of the public. Please note that this directory is distinct from NC ALUES, which serves a different purpose.

Please use the link below to create an entry in the directory for your program/service within 14 days of the date of the email. Once your entry is submitted, it will undergo a review process. Once approved, an entry will typically "go live" within 14 days of submission by a program provider.

Once your program or service is included in our directory, you can expect to get an email from the system every 6 months, asking you to review and update your entry, if needed. Programs that do not respond to system emails every 6 months will be hidden from view until we have confirmed that you are still active.

We are aware that some agencies offer multiple services/programs concurrently. The Service Directory requires that you complete a separate program entry form for each service/component you offer at each distinct location. We will be sending you a separate email and link to complete an entry for each component funded. This entry process allows us to provide juvenile justice employees with a list of appropriate programs matched to youth's assessed needs at the time of case planning. If you have additional services/programs that are **not luvenile justice funded** and that you would like added, please make you request via email to <u>SVC DPS.JI.D9.Program.Approval@ncdps.gov</u> so that we can send you a link to an entry form for each service. You may also direct any other questions about the directory or this same email address, or to <u>SVC DPS.JI.D9.Program.Approval@ncdps.gov</u>. Please note that ALLIES program names are recorded as Program Name: Component Name in the directory.

We thank you for your willingness to contribute to this directory. By doing so, you will be making it easier to connect some of our state's most vulnerable youth and families to needed services like those you offer. NCAR vs YASI

NCAR

Required for SPEP, the information collected on *structures* and *SPEPable services* tells the story of the youth that JCPC programs are actually working with.

NCAR = Risk Score

YASI

The more information providers have, may lend to making informed decisions about youth's needs, strengths, etc.

YASI = Risk, Needs, Strengths, Trauma and Service Planning

 Collects more info and provides highly specific info for targeting services to needs.
