
Mecklenburg County Violence Profile



Mecklenburg County, in southwestern North Carolina, has a population of 1,202,953 and is predominantly urban. The largest city is Charlotte with a population of 935,017. The closest trauma center is Atrium Health Carolinas Medical Center (in Charlotte).

Violent Deaths

Mecklenburg County had 243 violent deaths* in 2022 85% of homicides and 51% of suicides in the past 10 years involved a firearm



The most common violent crimes were aggravated assault (66.4%) and robbery (26.0%)


