## **Moore County Violence Profile**





Moore County had 29 violent deaths\* in 2022



All Violent Deaths and Firearm Deaths by Manner; Moore County, 2013-2022




In Moore County, 52% of all homicide deaths involved an argument or conflict

#### Crime

In 2023, Moore County had a total crime count of 4,693 with 139 violent crimes\*

Violent crime in Moore County has increased by 4% in the past year



The most common violent crimes were aggravated assault (66.2%) and rape (13.7%)
