# **Polk County Violence Profile**




Polk County, in southwestern North Carolina, has a population of 20,156 and is predominantly rural. The largest city is Tryon (pop.1,634). The closest trauma centers are Mission Hospitals and Atrium Health Cleveland (both 45 miles from Tryon).

In 2023, Polk County had a total crime count of 954 with 26 violent crimes\*


Violent crime in Polk County has increased by 73% in the past year

The most common violent crimes were aggravated assault (73.1%) and murder & non-negligent manslaughter (7.7%)


