Tyrrell County Violence Profile




Tyrrell County, located in northeastern North Carolina, has a population of 3,437 and is predominantly rural. The largest city is Columbia with a population of 599. The closest trauma center is ECU Medical Center (80 miles from Columbia).

In 2023, Tyrrell County had a total crime count of 268 with 5 violent crimes*

The most common violent crimes were aggravated assault (60.0%) and murder & non-negligent manslaughter (20.0%)

Tyrrell County had a reporting coverage of 100% of the population compared to the statewide coverage of 98% (2021). 
Non-Hispanic White residents have the highest rates of violent death in Tyrrell County
