FLASH FLOOD SAFETY TIPS

- Move to higher ground when
 - A Flash Flood Warning is issued
 - Any possibility of a flash flood exists
 - Do not wait for instructions!
- Do not walk through moving water
- Do not drive into flooded areas
- Do not ignore traffic barricades that close off flooded roadways
- Do not camp or park along streams, rivers, or creeks

Receiving Severe Weather Alerts

• NOAA Weather Radio (NWR):

- · Broadcasts continuous weather information
- · Audible alert when watches/warnings are issued
- Purchased at electronic and large retail stores for <\$40

• Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA):

- Alerts via cell phone or mobile device
- No need to download an app or subscribe to a service
- Alerts look like text message
- Free service!
- Cell Phone Apps:
 - Many to choose from that provide real-time NWS alerts
 - · Some are free, while others charge a small fee

Emergency Alert System (EAS) + Radio/TV:

- Warnings via broadcast, cable, satellite, and wireline services
- Tune to your local TV, radio station, or web site for details!
