GCC will accept grant applications from Nov. I, 2022 to Jan. 31, 2023. Three committees oversee these applications: Crime Victims Services, Criminal Justice Improvements and Juvenile Justice. The Oct. 12, 2022 Writing Workshop addressed application requirements and changes. Justice Data at Your Fingertips

Earlier this year, the Criminal Justice Analysis Center, housed within GCC, announced the launch of the new Justice Data Portal, which will serve as North Carolina's clearinghouse for justice data from agencies in the state. The portal provides public access to data from across the criminal justice system through interactive, easyto-use dashboards. The initial release of the Justice Data Portal used data provided by the
