How will the mitigation activity be implemented?

The Town had an engineering report completed in January 2022 that accessed the condition and issues with their stormwater drainage system. The report identified areas of stormwater concern and provided general recommendations for improvements. The Town has suffered flooding issues due to an inadequate stormwater drainage system, and the Town would like to upgrade and modernize their stormwater drainage system using nature-based and hybrid solutions where possible. The proposed mitigation activity is focused on six locations (labeled as Areas of Concern and Isolated Areas of Concern) noted in the report. Stormwater infrastructure in each area is lacking in capacity. There is significant flooding in Area 1, localized flooding in Area 2, and localized ponding in Area 3. A structure has been built on top of an existing concrete drainage pipe in Area 4. There is an accumulation of runoff in Area 5 and road flooding in Area 6. The 2022 report provides multiple recommendations including systemwide improvements, updated maintenance practices, and standards for future development. It also makes other specific recommendations for areas of concern that require the most immediate attention, such as Area 1. One recommendation (for Area 1) is a conversion of property to a public park and/or detention pond for the Town's stormwater drainage system. Along with alleviating flooding in this area of concern, the report states it would also alleviate drainage issues downstream (possibly Area 2). The purpose of this mitigation activity is to explore solutions for all six locations. Solutions could include promoting infiltration and disbursement of stormwater as well as increasing permeable surface area. Again, nature-based and hybrid solutions are preferred where possible.

What is the scope of work of the proposal? Will it result in a complete project application for future funding opportunities?

The proposal is for a study and cost estimate for stormwater improvements in the specified geographic areas. The selected areas are based on the findings and recommendations of the 2022 report. The following services are proposed for each area: - Base mapping created in GIS or topographic survey. - Geotechnical investigation. - Watershed evaluation. - Development of initial mitigation steps (or development of mitigation strategies). - Preliminary engineering design and cost estimating. - Graphic report with project recommendations. Community outreach would also be included. The results of this project would be used to pursue future funding opportunities.

Who will manage and complete the mitigation activity?

The activity will be managed by Eastern Carolina Council of Governments. A consultant will complete the feasibility study and engineering cost estimate.

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As outlined in the BRIC 2022 NOFO, sub-recipient management costs (SRMC) activities may include: - Delivery of technical assistance (e.g., plan reviews, planning workshops, training) to support the implementation of mitigation activities. - Managing awards (e.g., quarterly reporting including managing Go/No-Go milestones for hazard mitigation projects submitted under the national competition, closeout). - Technical monitoring (e.g., site visits, technical meetings). - Staff salary costs directly related to performing the activities listed.

This project is primarily focused on alleviating flooding within the Town caused by large precipitation events. Flooding often affect public streets and can impede transportation access. This lack of access could affect the mobility of residents and affect the delivery of vital government services, which could lead to a multitude of problems during a natural disaster. Inundation by floodwaters could increase maintenance costs for the Town and damage private property, both of which could cause serious financial issues for a small and vulnerable community.

Approximately two years starting when all funding becomes available.

There is a narrow range of alternatives considering financial constraints, nature of identified hazards, and the relatively small geographic size and limited capacity of the Town's current stormwater drainage system. Nature-based, constructed, and hybrid solutions would ideally be considered and compared. Preferred solutions would be cost-effective and easy to maintain for a small community. The engineering report has an alternative recommendation for the area of interest which involves elevating impacted homes.
